MINUTES OF THE 37TH WELLINGTON COLLEGIANS CRICKET CLUB ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

HELD ON MONDAY 14 AUGUST 2007 AT ANDERSON PARK AT 1930

2. Apologies

2.1. L D Macer, D Kershaw, H Bedford, E J Stewart, D Boldt, R C (Bob) Pope, B Steele. The apologies were accepted (McBeth/Marra).

3. In memoriam - G L Whyte MBE

3.1. Dilip Deva spoke about the achievements of G L Whyte MBE, a former life member of the club who passed away recently. Paddy Marra added that another former member, J Hill had also passed away. A moment's silence was observed by the meeting in respect.

4. 36th AGM minutes

4.1. The minutes of the 36th Annual General Meeting held on 14 August 2006 were held as true and correct (McBeth/Tong).

5. Adoption of Annual Report

- 5.1. The President submitted his report which was taken as read.
- 5.2. The Chairman spoke to his report and added some further comments. He mentioned that the Junior Club was not mentioned in the report but that it was served by an excellent committee. Collaboration between the Junior and Senior clubs was becoming more important, particularly in the area of sourcing funding from charitable trusts, and in the need to re-recruit junior players post-college. He mentioned the unfortunate loss of the 2A team and the relegation of the senior reserve team.
- 5.3. He discussed the serious challenges in retention of players and in recruitment, but applauded the work of Jamie Tong, Damien Grant, Clinton Butler and Nick Whittington in the off-season. The club is hopeful that their work bears fruit. He wished Nick Whittington well as he goes overseas to undertake post-graduate study. He thanked the outgoing management committee, and then indicated that, sadly, for personal commitments he was unable to continue as chairman.
- 5.4. The President intimated the club's regret that Glen had to step down, but thanked him for his time, work and achievements. He will be sorely missed.
- 5.5. The Treasurer noted the club's steady financial position. Turnover was lower than expected due to a number of factors, principally the poor pre-Christmas weather, the loss of the 2A team (despite having paid affiliation fees etc), and the outlay for the new stairs. However, the securing of a Century Foundation grant by Glen was an excellent result and paid for the affiliation of both the Junior and Senior clubs.
- 5.6. Alan publicly acknowledged the assistance of Graeme Sugden, our Honorary Auditor for his work over the last few years and for his advice during the season, and Brian Steele, who assisted to get the books ready for the financial review.

- 5.7. Glen thanked Alan for his efforts. He has done a tremendous job at short notice.
- 5.8. The Annual Report was duly adopted (McBeth/Tong)

7. Subscriptions

7.1. Subscriptions were confirmed at last year's levels (Neal/Tong)

8. General Business

- 8.1. Alan Orpin raised the need to reconsider clause 17 of the Constitution which requires that the honorary Auditor "audit" all of the accounts of the club. An increase in the requirements for audits now makes it impractical and very expensive for small clubs to take the number of steps required for the compliance necessary for an audit. It was suggested that the clause be altered to require a "financial review" or "independent financial review".
- 8.2. Paddy Marra indicated that the new Charities Commission may require an audit for compliance with its rules. Alasdair McBeth mentioned the need to ensure compliance with the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.
- 8.3. Jamie Tong questioned whether charitable trusts will refuse applications for funding if the finances of the club have not been audited. The feeling of the meeting was that this was unlikely as trusts are more interested in the correct spending of grant money.
- 8.4. It was resolved that the management committee is to investigate the situation and if desired, pursue the alteration though the constitution (McBeth/Whittington).
- 8.5. Clinton Butler thanked the Committee for its work in the past season and especially Dilip Deva for his hours spent as Club Captain, as gear steward, and particularly in his role as CDO and coach.
- 8.6. Sandy Yule publicly acknowledged the work of Bob Swan and Ted Stewart for their years of work in building up the gear stocks of the club.

- 8.7. Graeme Carruthers raised the issue of the crossroads which was a theme of the Annual Report. He asked the outgoing committee for their thoughts on what should be done and whether regaining the Pearce Cup should continue to be a priority.
- 8.8. Glen Neal mentioned that in his view the recruitment issue was the most pressing in this regard. Unless the off-season recruitment succeeds there may not be the sufficient depth to field a competitive Hazlett Trophy side. Compared to the success of other clubs such as Easts and Karori, this was a worry. He indicated the possibility of an amalgamation with Karori and/or University but worried what we could bring to the table in such a case. The problem was, with the collapse of Upper Valley and the weakness of Hutt Districts, the Hazlett Trophy was as winnable as ever.
- 8.9. Graeme Carruthers suggested contact be made with the likes of Brian Waddle and I Taylor for assistance in deciding on the future of the club.
- 8.10. Phillipa Bedford stated that where the club was strong was in its women playing numbers and the junior club which in fact made the club overall a powerful one in terms of an amalgamation. Sally Morrison backed this point up by suggesting that last season's successful experiment with playing college players in the Super 8 grade will bear fruit this season as the players provided the bulk of a competitive senior women's side.
- 8.11. Sandy Yule mentioned the current trend that Wellington College cricketers seemed to be more attracted to Karori and Easts than Collegians.
- 8.12. Jamie Tong suggested that the real issue was the transient nature of the collegians playing stocks. The senior men's teams were largely made up of university educated young professionals who played for the club for around three years before career advancement took them overseas.
- 8.13. Grant Coppersmith raised the fact that many of the Wellington College players form the 3rd XI and lower tend to drift out of the game post-college and this is where we should be focusing our recruitment.
- 8.14. Dilip Deva acknowledged the support he had received during the year from Glen Neal, Alan Orpin, Nick Whittington, Alasdair McBeth (saying that the club is very fortunate to have people of Alasdair's expertise) and Andy Fulbrook.
- 9. The meeting closed at 8.20pm.



I am delighted to present my second report to you as President of your club.

The season was a season of two halves. Before Christmas the season could not have been worse. Visions of winning the Hazlett and being promoted to the Pearce cup had been forgotten as we languished at the bottom of the Hazlett competition. The concern was over demotion.

The fact that after Christmas the seniors recovered to end up a creditable fifth, was a testament not only to the senior team but the club as a whole and certain individuals within it.

There are a number of people who must be thanked. The first person to be thanked without doubt is Sally Morrison. She put her hand up to be Chairman when no one else would take it on. Her drive and enthusiasm was instrumental in turning the club around and putting us in a position where we can look forward to next season with excitement.

I would like to also thank the Board who worked incredibly hard on your behalf and made some bold and insightful decisions to see the club move forward. The commitment was huge with fortnightly meetings and the work required between meetings.

I also thank James Franklin for the time and effort he put into the club while waiting for his knee operation and convalescing. We are lucky to not only have a New Zealand representative player in our ranks but a person who wants his club to succeed and puts in the time and effort necessary.

I also thank some former iconic players in the club who gave of their time to help the club when it needed it. In particular, I mention Bert Vance and Matt Roche who helped with coaching and mentoring the senior team.

One of the decisions the club made was to appoint a senior coach and that was Mark Coles. It was a great decision and I thank Mark who picked up the team halfway through the season to see it end up in the position that it did.

Another decision that the Board made was contracting an overseas professional player and Deepak Joon arrived for the second part of the season. His contribution to the second half of the season was outstanding.

These decisions made by the Board involved money and the reality is to be successful in senior cricket in Wellington costs money. A lot of time is taken by the Board to source funds, particularly with the various charities. It is a strategic aim for the club to obtain non-contestable funding and if any club member has any ideas or contacts that could help the club achieve this objective, please tell a member of the Board. Sustainable and reliable funding is essential for a club to be successful and what sponsor wouldn't want to be associated with the best club in Wellington.

But the season was not just about the senior team. To me as a person who played and captained the club's second team for many years, I was delighted that the Senior 3s, ably captained by another Alastair, bounced back from being demoted last season to win the grade and promotion to Senior 2 for next season. Any strong senior club needs a strong second team playing in a high grade and we have achieved that. I congratulate the Senior 3 team for their success.

Congratulations also goes to the legends who also won their grade and promotion to 2A next season, and the Senior Women's team who were second in the 20/20 competition.

Finally, I congratulate all club members who gained representative honours.

Another highlight for the season for me was the annual prize giving held in the Norwood Room at the Basin Reserve. It was a fantastic evening, an evening befitting the club. Dilip Deva received a special award that evening for his long standing service to the club. A special thank you to our former President, Brian Waddle, who was MC for the evening and Mike Copeland, our guest speaker who features on our Honours Board in the 1970s.

I would like to also thank the many former players of the club for their continued interest and involvement. It was disappointing that the two occasions during the season involving former players were badly affected by rain. In particular, I was devastated that the Presidents XI was unable to give the Chairmans XI a pasting and the Collegians XI versus Wanderers XI game was also washed out.

These games and the old Collegians day are here to stay and will feature in the club's calendar next season.

The Board's initiative in hiring a marquee for the 4th day is also applauded. It was a great day for the club, if a bit windy.

The junior club continues to be a jewel in the club's crown. The junior committee, ably led by Andy Fulbrook, do a wonderful job.

I was also delighted that the club played the Wellington College First XI in a 20/20 game to prepare them for the Gillette Cup. Wellington Collegians was originally Wellington College Old Boys and enjoys a strong and close association with Wellington College. Wellington Collegians is the natural place for students leaving Wellington College to go to to enjoy their cricket. This has always been the foundation of the club and one reason for it being so successful. An annual fixture against the Wellington College First XI is a must for the club.

Finally, I must also mention that the club granted David Grey Memorial Scholarships to Reece Cargill, Vijay Chhagan and Nathan Brown. I congratulate them and hope that the scholarships they received help them achieve their goals and enjoy their cricket at Collegians. Hannah Bedford was also granted a scholarship but unfortunately she was unable to take up her scholarship due to an injury. We are very fortunate to have the David Grey bequest and be able to provide scholarships to our young players.

The Board has worked hard during the winter months to prepare for next season and I feel confident that we can look forward to next season with keen anticipation.

CHAIRMANS REPORT SALLY MORRISON



THE 2007/2008 SEASON

Last season someone made the mistake of suggesting to me that cricket is just another game and what's more that cricket clubs are dying as part of societies move to fewer team based activities and more individual pursuits.

I fundamentally disagree and I believe this year for Collegians has been a wonderful example of a group of people who enjoy their sport, their teams and most importantly their Club.

At the conclusion of the season we held an official prize giving, catered, scripted, Brian Waddle MC, guest speaker Mike Copeland. Our theme was to thank Dilip Deva Club man for his many years of service for the Club. At the prize giving, held at the Basin Reserve Norwood room, over 120 people attended (despite only anticipating 100 attendees). It was an outstanding night that for me illustrated that community sport is still very much alive and that Wellington Collegians Cricket Club has a heart that is beating strongly.

This year was a year of consolidation and also of growth and new opportunities.

It is important to acknowledge that we were particularly blessed with a stunning summer; this in part would have contributed to a dramatic increase in bar takings over the season. This and the 'drink the bar dry' night (reaching desired dryness), the Christmas party, the New Years Cocktail party (!), past players day the end of year function and pretty much every Saturday night! The new couches were a valuable addition and our new association with Lion saw the welcome return of the Jug and the introduction of the Pint Club.

This year we worked with Cricket Wellington to run the National Bank Marquee at the Basin Reserve English Test day four. This was a magnificent day for the Club as we took pride of place for a day at the Test.



This season we also procured a senior coach and at the end of November worked hard to engage a professional player from India who joined us in 2008 and became the senior men's top run scorer despite only playing half the season.

On the park we had a successful season. We turned around the senior men's team early season form (last in the one day competition) to an enduring fifth in March. This season was an important platform to continue the climb to retain our rightful place in Pearce Cup.

The senior women grew again this year developing several youth players along the way. Memorable moments included a win over Taita and a second placing in the twenty twenty competition. Several age group Wellington players and three Domestic level players were also a highlight for the club as well as a new New Zealand representative- Kerry Anne Tomlinson New Zealand development.

The senior seconds were faultless in their pursuit of their grade title and we now have a reserve team in the valuable grade of senior second, well done gentlemen you were ruthless.

The 2A Spartans have been a great addition to the Club joining us from Brooklyn performing consistently on the park and outstandingly off it. Great work Byron and Matt for taking out the Cricket Wellington awards with your 324 run partnership.

The Legends achieved indeed what they were born to achieve by winning 2B. This team is an example to all sides with several players performing well but the team always coming through with gritty performances and stunning repartee. Congratulations Legends and welcome to 2A.

The FalconHawke are by far the most sophisticated side in the Club filled with educated young men fluid in both English and Hawke. The FalconHawke take cricket and defining oneself to a new level.

Our two one day sides the ThunderGods and Axemen fought the good fight each weekend for the Club and despite struggling with playing numbers mid way through the season both sides finished strongly. The highlight of the season being some strong batting displays from Regan Heal and Jason Aitofi and a phenomenal run from Nick Tyler when he bludgeoned 224* off only 32 overs to rip apart a defenseless Brooklyn side; The next week he scored 148* proving his class.

When it came to Domination however nothing could equal the power of the Div 1 Super 8s Dominators who would have cut a swath of destruction through the grade had they not been oft called upon to reserve for the senior women's side.

The Div 2 Lower Order Super 8s side was the most consistent performer in the Club consistently looking good each time they took the park. It is great to have three women's sides in the Club and the Div 2s always punch above their weight both on and off the park- great representation girls.

The season began with four one-day games. We started well with a strong win against Taita on the back of a Jeremy Riddell 82*, and some excellent bowling, particularly from Rakesh Champaneri. The game was also notable for the return from retirement of Brent "Jerry" Maguire (though I'm not sure if you can call it a retirement if they never missed a game. More like an excuse not to turn up to training...). The following match saw the disruption of Jamie Tong's retirement as well. Unfortunately his 5-fer was not enough to prevent us from losing narrowly to a good Johnsonville side.

Wins against Petone-Riverside and Easts followed (Senthil Selvaratnam taking 4-9 in the Easts game), before we gained revenge on Johnsonville in the first two-day game of the season. Our five-wicket win was thanks largely to a 10-wicket bag from Clinton Butler, and more runs from Jeremy Riddell. This put us top of the table (a position we would not relinquish), and it was strengthened by another two-day win, this time against Easts, thanks to a Dougal McLachlan 12-wicket haul.

The next game saw our only other loss as we went down to Taita after a first innings collapse – all out for 82. Despite a deficit of 140 odd runs, we fought back hard on day two: Nathan Brown and I put on over 100 for the first wicket, and we could easily have played out for a draw. The search for quick runs and a target to bowl at, however, had us all out and Taita needing 126 to win. They were in trouble thanks to some excellent bowling from Iain McIsaac, but we still needed three wickets when the winning runs came. The captain will shoulder the blame for this loss – perhaps discretion would have been the better part of valour on this occasion.

This made the next game at home to Petone-Riverside a crunch match, and it turned out to be the game of the season!! Another 5-fer from Dougal McLachlan saw Petone labour to 250 in 70 overs. Scoring at a good clip we had knocked off a large chunk by stumps and declared behind early on the second day to try and push a result. Petone came out blazing, with even Dale Steyn being displaced to Bowen Street. But a Hamish Maude 5-fer and four more to the Afrikaner put us back on top, leaving us needing 200 to win in 30 overs. Runs from Devon Maher, Dane Gunnell, and my second 50 of the match kept us up with the run-rate all the way, and with five overs to go it looked like we had it won. Dougal, at number 11, was out of his whites, had packed his bag and was heading off to see Dilip at the bar when four wickets fell quicker than a crocodile strikes in the zambezi. Suddenly he was heading out to bat with four runs still needed, eight balls remaining, and a "I can't believe this is happening" look on his face. But we had faith in our number 11. He just had to survive two balls and then CJ Berry, always the man for a crisis, would do the business at the other end. Dougal did his job, but then it turned out that CJ had plenty of faith in Dougal too, as he took a single off the first ball of the last over to put Dale Steyn back Fortunately he managed to scramble a single himself, before CJ on strike. nonchalantly flicked the ball in front of square leg for the winning runs. Magic.

It was back to one-day mode after this and three comfortable wins followed against University, Hutt District, and Stokes Valley, before a two-day draw with University. Johnsonville had pushed us hard all season and they managed an outright win when we drew with Uni. This left them just one point behind us with two two-day matches remaining. However, the team stepped up another gear and responded to this pressure by recording our two most convincing wins of the season to run away with the title.

The first of these was an innings victory against Hutt District (who, in the end, just edged Johnsonville for second place). Expecting the ball to seam, I put the opposition in. The ball did not seam. And the openers had put on 60-odd before young lain McIsaac produced two outstanding deliveries to get rid of them both. Nathan Brown then produced 22 overs of virtually unplayable left-arm orthodox spin, taking 5-45 and Hutt were all out for 156. In reply we were in trouble early, but CJ Berry and Jamie Tong set the ship right, to leave us with a small lead overnight. We took charge on the second day with Senthil Selvaratnam and Rakesh Champaneri adding 100 together from the lower-middle order to push us out to 298/9dec. We then bowled superbly, battling the rain clouds, and managing to roll Hutt for 106. Smart money was on the draw, but Senty knocked the last man over as the rain came down.

The last game, fittingly at home, was against Stokes Valley. Iain McIsaac bowled another penetrating spell, but unfortunately it only lasted 4 balls until his injury plagued season was ended by a hamstring strain (or was it the calf this time? or the back? or the...). Rakesh bowled superbly, taking 4-fer, but Stokes Valley still managed 250 in 60 overs on a good batting track. At stumps we had rattled on 170 for 3 in 37 overs, and then Devon and I put the foot down on the second morning, with us all out eventually for a mammoth 401. A demoralised Stokes Valley were then removed for 150-odd, with Hamish Maude ripping through the middle order. The biggest celebration of the day though was when Dougal McLachlan took his 50th wicket of the season. We needed to knock off 16 runs for the win, and did this without loss to secure the Championship. Thanks to Dilip, the official 12th man for the day, who provided the beer out on the wicket after the game.

That was the season, and it remains but to highlight a few key performers with bat and ball. My thanks to all the lads for putting up with me this season. You were a pleasure to captain. And thanks also to Dilip and Gak for their help throughout the year. Unfortunately, I will not be around for the 2008/09 season as work has taken me to Paris. But fear not, conditions here are good and the track is firm. All the best for 08/09!!

Batting highlights

Jeremy Riddell, always talking and always elegant at the crease, had an excellent season with the bat. In particular his batting pre-Christmas was a delight to watch – and it wasn't until his 6th innings that he scored less than 30. His match-winning 85 in the one-dayer against University was perhaps the innings of the season.

Devon Maher also performed well with the bat. Dev was in destructive form at the crease, and you'd struggle to find an innings where he didn't score at a run-a-ball. 50 on club debut against Johnsonville, and sending four balls down Bowen Street during his 79 against Stokes Valley were highlights. Brent Maguire, Mathan Thevakulasingam and CJ Berry were steady performers, while cameo efforts from Nathan Pilalis, Dane Gunnell and Jamie Tong were gratefully received. James Ryan only played three games for the Reserves, but made a huge

impact in that time. A bludgeoned 100 on club debut was followed by 65 in the next game. Pity he couldn't catch a cold in the gully!!

The skipper chipped in with a few runs at the top of the order, including 140 vs Stokes Valley, and 96 vs Taita. In an interesting tactical decision he decided not to score any runs in February.

Bowling highlights

Doc bowled with his usual fire and was very well supported by Matt from the other end. We had them three down and things were looking OK, until their Captain and their main all-rounder (the same guy who left to go to Beckham) started to manufacture a worrying partnership. We hadn't got the all-rounder out in either innings of the two-day match and they were easily keeping to the run rate required when the old warhorse: Bump (or Nudge as he's now known after loosing about 15kg) was handed the ball. A wayward shot to Treacle at square leg and their all-rounder was gone. This and vital overs from Project, putting down the gloves to pick up the ball, getting two wickets into the bargain, gave us a vital 6 point one-day victory. 2007/08 was a new beginning in many senses, and the end of an era in others. The newly named Thundergods started the season where we had left off in 2006/07 racing to top of the table by Christmas. Unfortunately, the Thundergods ranks were ravaged by injury, holidays and general unavailability post Christmas, which saw us lose three matches in a row. We were unable to recover from that stutter and ended up finishing the season a credible fourth, but disappointing in the context of our dominance last season. Player recruitment and retention was the main issue in the 2007/08 season and sometimes it was a battle to get eleven men on the park.


Bat of the Year – Regan's MRF Genius. Not only did Reg score 434 runs with it, but Jase scored a few with it as well, including his maiden ton.

TREASURER'S REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENTS ALAN ORPIN

Overview

The 2007-08 season saw a concerted effort from the Committee to commit financial resources in the Club's future. As intimated at previous AGM's, player recruitment and the Club's sustainability were recognised as growing challenges. To that end, a payed administrative position was established and Nathan Pilalis was appointed in the new role of Club Manager, a permanent coach and an overseas professional were engaged for the senior team, a Collegian's website was developed, and there was reinvigoration of the Club's social activities (e.g. Clubroom functions, marquee at English Test, formal Prize Giving Dinner etc). The Club Development Officer Programme sponsored by Cricket Wellington saw a \$5,200 reduction in funding for junior and school coaching from last year, only partly mitigated by a successful NZCT grant. Collectively these factors placed significant pressure on the operating budget of the Senior Club, resulting in an \$8,549 deficit, but with no outstanding liabilities. The Junior Club remains very strong in terms of playing numbers and financials, to the credit of its Committee and supporters.

Financial turnover benefited from the excellent summer weather, resulting in a \$2,250 increase in net pavilion trading over last season, despite the reduction in playing numbers. The entry of a new 2A side after Christmas increased player numbers to the benefit of the Senior Club in general and strengthened the senior player base.

Affiliation and ground fees from Cricket Wellington were \$8,452, down \$4,042 over last year, largely due to a reduction in team entries. A corollary of lower player numbers, Senior subscription fees were also down \$1,473 over last season and represent an ongoing trend of reducing discretionary income for the Senior Club. On a more positive note, Junior subscriptions increased by \$5,549 to \$27,545.

The major items of capital expenditure supported from grants were \$8,642 for new playing equipment and \$6,433 for cricket balls. The development of the Collegians webpage at \$3,019 was the largest item of capital expenditure not supported by a grant.

Grants and sponsorship

A major financial highlight of the season was the \$8,009 increase in grants, which attained a total of \$27,000. The \$19,320 grant from New Zealand Community Trust dominated the balance sheet, assisted by smaller contributions from a variety of trusts (see financial review for details). However, The Club applied for \$71,168 of grants assistance from trusts over the 2007-08 season, yielding a success rate of just under 40%. Such a rate is considered quite reasonable for a sports club but emphasises that grants represent a significant challenge and investment of the Club's administrative effort.

Early in the season the Club engaged in discussions with Lion Nathan regarding longterm sponsorship by way of assistance with bar stock for specific social functions and other product incentive programmes. The Club now has an ongoing relationship with the Speights Ale House and The Cambridge Hotel.

Scholarships

The Club supported three senior players with Scholarships from the AD Grey Memorial Fund (Reece Cargill, Vijay Chhagan, and Nathan Brown) and assisted two Collegians players with representation at the University Tourney.

The term deposits continue to show healthy growth and have benefited from the high interest rates that have persisted throughout the financial year. With a strong focus on player recruitment for the forthcoming season there is a desire to better utilise the AD Grey Memorial Fund to foster emerging players from Wellington College into the Senior squad. The Committee anticipates offering more scholarships to students for the 2008-09 season.

Comments for the upcoming season

Financially the Club cannot sustain its current level of coaching and administrative activities without external funding. Whilst grants continue to be a fruitful avenue for financial support, most charitable trusts have reinforced that the increasing number of applications in concert with the steady rise in costs will ultimately lead to more competition for less money. Non-contestable sources of external income are critical to the Club's sustainability, namely through corporate sponsorship and the establishment of long-term relationships with suppliers. Growing compliance costs such as the annual independent financial review, insurance, council fees, PAYE, and Kiwi Saver are concerning.

Outcomes of the independent financial review

In accordance with new guidelines from the Institute of Chartered Accountants, this year's independent financial review was undertaken by a registered auditor. Accordingly, there is an increase in compliance costs to \$1,250 (excl GST). As a slight departure from the format of previous seasons, the Auditor requested that all bank account balances be stated in an effort to add transparency of the Club assets, rather than only stating the accumulated reserves or combined figures.

Acknowledgements

Lion Nathan, The Speight's Ale House and The Cambridge Hotel lent generous support to the Club's social activities, particularly the Christmas and end of year functions, and the Basin Reserve Test Match marquee.

Paddy Marra and Will Sadler offered advice on technical financial matters at various times throughout the season, and Brian Steele generously gave time and help preparing the books for the independent financial review. Thank you.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT TO WELLINGTON COLLEGIANS CRICKET CLUB INC.

I have reviewed the financial statements of Wellington Collegians Cricket Club Inc. for the year ended May 31, 2008 in accordance with the Review Engagement Standards issued by the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants.

A review is limited primarily to inquiries of Club personnel and analytical review procedures applied to financial data and thus provide less assurance than an audit. I have not performed an audit and accordingly I do not express an audit opinion.

Based on my review, nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the accompanying financial statements, on pages 1 to 5, do not give a true and fair view.
