MINUTES OF THE 34^{TH} ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE WELLINGTON COLLEGIANS CRICKET CLUB HELD ON MONDAY 9 AUGUST AT THE CLUB ROOMS, ANDERSON PARK.

Adoption of the Annual Report

Paddy Marra spoke to the annual report. He reflected on the year, particularly the success of the women's team and the men's senior reserve team. He made two particular points.

- There was reason to be very concerned about sports clubs' future access to Pub Charity funds. Under planned legislation, only registered charities would be able to access these funds, and it was not clear that sports clubs would be able to register as charities. They were not regarded as charities under present legislation. Paddy suggested that members might like to take an interest in this matter and take up the issue with appropriate people.
- He thanked Graeme Carruthers, Peter Palmer, Will Sadler and Dilip Deva for their hard work as office holders during the year. He also thanked other committee members, particularly those retiring for their support and contribution during this and previous years.

Graeme Carruthers congratulated the committee on its hard work during the year and particularly noted the financially healthy state of the Club.

The Annual Report was duly adopted.

Financial Reports

Paddy Marra noted that the accounts revealed a significant surplus for both the Senior and Junior Clubs. This had been achieved because of two main factors:

- significant grants from the NZ Community Trust
- for the senior club, a high level of payment of club fees from players.

However, he noted that bar takings were somewhat down from previous years, partly reflecting the weather. However, he urged players and supporters to support the Club's social activities.

General Business

The following points were raised in general business.

- Dilip reported that Past President P P Henley had passed away during the year. The meeting stood for a minute's silence as a mark of respect for Mr Henley.
- Dilip thanked Will Sadler for arranging the printing of the Annual Report at no cost to the Club.
- Dilip reported that he had updated the addresses of life members and vice presidents and had forwarded them all copies of the Annual Report. As a result some donations had been received.
- Tania McCord recorded her thanks to the Club for the support it had given to the Super 8 team – in particular, from Wainui Bedford.
- Darrin Wilkinson raised the question of coaching services for the senior club. Paddy reported that attempts season had been made to obtain a coach for last but it had proved difficult to find someone suitable with the time available. He reported that Scott McHardy had asked James Franklin (who was currently playing cricket in England) to look out for a fast bowler with a coaching certificate.
- Paddy reported that Club was on the look out for some batsman for the senior reserve team and for a couple of quick bowlers.
- A number of members indicated that a group of 2A players may want to create their own team. This could create some holes in the 2A team.
- Mal McLean reported on discussions with the Wellington College coach regarding rebuilding the relationship with Wellington College to encourage more school leavers to join the club, and to work more closely with the Junior Club.
- Scott McHardy reported that the pre-season nets were booked from 1 September until labour weekend. All players were welcome.
- Graeme thanked retiring Secretary Peter Palmer and retiring committee member Brian Steele for their contribution over the last few years.
- Wainui expressed thanks to Graeme as retiring President, for his support over the last two years.

The meeting closed around 9pm.

PRESIDENTS REPORT

It was a pleasure to return to cricket club scene as I started a 2 year commitment as President. I was soon given an early reminder of where I was as I fronted up to my first committee meeting on a cold winters evening in June last year. It is nice to know that some things don't change. However, I was soon encouraged as I quickly appreciated the very conscientious and skilled effort, ably lead by Paddy Marra that the committee gives to the club. I'll come back to that later.

On the playing side, one must express a little disappointment that the Senior Men's team did not achieve promotion and the Senior Women's Team could not maintain their high standards they set from the previous year as grade champions. However there were some notable results in the heart of the club as noted in the Chairman's Report.

The Junior club continues to run very efficiently and with excellent playing numbers. It is nice to reflect and we can say this now that this is where it all begins as witnessed by the home grown success of Jimmy Franklin. Congratulations Jimmy on your Black Cap selection and to others who made representative honours.

We have been fortunate to have had the services over recent years of Scott McHardy who has now decided that it is time to move on to other challenges and responsibilities. Thanks Monty and all the best for the future.

We will also be losing the services of a few of committee members, Will Sadler, Mal McLean and Wainui Bedford who have given the club dedicated service. We hope to see you back in the ranks again in the not to distant future. Thanks for your contribution.

The apparent lack of success I referred to earlier with the Senior team has had a positive note. During the winter the committee has revisited a number of areas of the Club – its structure, communication, planning and organisation. We have listened to the group of players from the likes of surveys and interviews and are now ready to put in place a structure and processes that will negate a few misconceptions that seem to exist, and make the running of the Club more transparent. I have always believed that the game is for benefit the players, not Administrators. This review, with a few pieces to be finalised, and the sound financial position that the club is in, will enable us to start the new season on the 'front foot'.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Paddy Marra

Three year's ago the Committee set itself three major objectives, to get our Senior Men's team back into Pearce Cup, our Women's team back into the senior grade and our Senior Reserve Men's team promoted from Senior 3 to Senior 2. Over that time we achieved two out of three of those objectives with the bonus of our Women's team winning the Women's Championship last year. However the final objective of getting back into Pearce Cup continues to elude us.

However, having said that we can say that we had a good season with two grade winners (2C and 4A) and two other teams that also went close to winning their grades with the result still in the balance in the final games of the season. We can also say that we had a very good season financially and I will come back to this later.

This year the objective is to again try to win promotion into Pearce Cup, and while Scott McHardy has retired and we have lost a couple of other senior players, we have already over the winter had a number of additions to the Club of players who have had senior or higher level experience. Ian Fisher, from Gloucester, who played a few games for us after Christmas last season when he was in Wellington on holiday, has agreed to join the Club as Coaching Coordinator and will oversee coaching from the Junior Club to the Senior team and will also be available to play for the Seniors.

Through James Franklin, we have been able to recruit Taraia Robin who played with Jimmy in the NZ Youth team and who debuted for Central Districts as a 19 year old. Taraia is a quick bowler and lower order batsman and we welcome him to the Club.

Once again we congratulate James Franklin on his selection for the Black Caps and Amanda Cooper for her selection for New Zealand A and the Wellington Blaze.

While the batsmen did not really fire this year in the men's top grades (Nish Goyat being the top senior run scorer with 475 runs – last season he scored over 500 runs and Monty over 600 runs), there were a few notable performances with the ball with Garrick Sutherland and Julian Brown both taking 6-fors for very few runs and Glen Eglington getting 7 for 18 in a Senior 2 match. The standout bowling performance was Nathan Brown's 8 for 48 in a 2A match as part of his 34 wickets for the season.

The outstanding team performance had to be the 2C team who went through the season unbeaten to win the grade and we had a similar outstanding performance in the Junior Club where the Premier teams (both Pre and Post Christmas) also went through the season undefeated with 14 wins from 14 games.

There are also numerous other very good performances that are mentioned throughout this Annual Report.

Our Junior Club remains one of the strongest in Wellington both by numbers, quality of administration and through members representing Wellington at various levels and tournaments and there is a comprehensive report on the Junior Club later in this Annual Report.

The Club had an excellent year financially, with a surplus of \$23,479 and with both the Senior and Junior Clubs recording surpluses of \$12,355 and \$11,124 respectively.

Having said that the Club is in a very good position financially, all New Zealand sports clubs are concerned about legislative changes currently before Parliament. This was raised in my report last year, but following representations from numerous sports clubs

and organizations some changes have been made to the Bill. However, what is clear is that the amount of money coming from the Pub charities that run the gaming machines in Pubs is getting smaller and the demands on these funds are getting bigger. We were very lucky last year in that after initially being turned down for grants we were able file smaller grants for coaching and other administration costs and have these granted. Already this year, our first grant application for winter training has been reduced to around two thirds of our application.

During the past season the Club received \$31,250 (previous season \$31,200) in grants, primarily from the New Zealand Community Trust, but also from the Lion Foundation, for which we are very appreciative and thank the New Zealand Community Trust and Lion Foundation for their sponsorship and grants.

We also wish to thank Cricket Wellington who also provided a coaching grant and Avery Ford who provided a car for part of the season for our coaching staff.

I would also like to thank Wholly Bagels for their support during the past season and all our other donors and supporters listed elsewhere in this Annual Report.

I would like to thank the Committee for their work during the past year, particularly Dilip Deva for his work as Club Captain and for looking after the Clubrooms and the Bar. I would also like to make a special thank you to retiring members of the Committee, especially Mal McLean, who has headed off overseas on his OE.

Before I close I would like to make special mention with regard to the past contributions form Scott (Monty) McHardy who retired at the end of last season after two great stints with the senior team, and also Wainui Bedford who is not standing for reelection to the Committee and who is also standing down as manager of the senior women's team, where she made an outstanding contribution.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

This season Club entered 7 men's and 3 Women's teams. In the Men's grades the Club entered a Senior team (Hazlett Trophy), which is the second tier senior grade in the competition, plus a Senior 2, 2A, 2C, 2D and two sides in the 4A one day grades. In the Women's grades the Club entered Senior Women's and two Super Eights teams.

All the grades got away to a solid start, with most teams recording early season wins. It was looking very promising for the club at Christmas with four teams leading their grades. In particular the senior reserve team which were promoted to Senior 2 from Senior 3 the previous season, leading after some miraculous results. Crucial losses to Onslow and then Karori in the last game of the season, in two day matches cost them the championship. They place 3rd in the competition.

Outstanding performances for the club came from the 2C team. They were too strong for their opponents and were placed 1st in the competition being unbeaten throughout the season. The Club entered two one day sides in the 4A grade and our 4AA went on to win the competition.

In the Women's competition the Super Eights section two team had a wonderful season and they lead all the way until their last match. Sadly they couldn't win the most important last game and they placed 2nd.

Representative Honours: James Franklin: New Zealand ODI's and Test Team and Wellington Firebirds; Nishant Goyat: Wellington Development team which tour to Australia; Aaron McCash: Wellington U19; Amanda Cooper: Wellington Blaze; Sally Morrison as Manager of Wellington Blaze. Hannah Bedford, Priya Patel, Olivia Dean were all members of the Wellington secondary School squad. They were also selected for the Wellington U19 team to tour Australia with Wainui Bedford as Manager.

JUNIOR CLUB REPORT 2004/05

SUMMARY

The 2004/05 season was again a successful one for the Junior Club, both on and off the field as we aimed to provide a positive cricketing environment and support to all our Primary School players aged 5 to 14.

As a Committee we actively seek to optimise player and parent enjoyment in their involvement with both cricket and Collegians, by maintaining a level of support unrivalled by any other junior club.

Whilst our numbers dropped from 2003/04 with 361 players and 35 teams Collegians retained its status as the largest junior cricket club in Wellington.

Highlights of the 2004/05 season included, the undefeated Premier teams (both Pre and Post Christmas) with14 wins from 14, the continuation of a well received and popular pre-season Spring training program open to all hard ball cricketers, and the recruitment and use of professional coaches.

FINANCIALS

Once again the Junior Club was able to secure grant funding from the New Zealand Community Trust, this helped fund the pre-season Spring training, purchase balls and replenish our team gear and pay for our administrator.

Towards the end of the season we welcomed Wholly Bagels as sponsor of Player of the Day and Player of the Season Trophies and look forward to working with them next season.

We were very fortunate in that the senior club obtained grant funding which covered our junior coaches during the season; this enabled the Junior Club to make an operating surplus of \$11,126.

We are aware that grant funding getting harder to obtain and feel that the level of reserves the Junior Club has built up to be adequate, but the Committee will continue to seek sources of funding to allow us to deliver the support to our junior members that we have done over the past three years.

JUNIOR COMMITTEE

The Junior Club is indeed fortunate to have a very active and hard working Committee. During the off season we have been working on recruiting further members to share the workload. We are continuing with the services of a paid Administrator with Emma Lawler returning for a second season.

We said farewell to a couple of longstanding committee members, Greg Forsythe and Jim Heffernan at Christmas as their boys left for College. Thanks go to Greg and Jim for all their efforts on behalf of the Junior Club.

We are generally holding our position as the largest clubs in most age groups; the U10's being a glaring exception with only two teams being fielded



As can be seen from the graph below junior club members have been declining over the past five years, this is despite the actions of Cricket Wellington who have been running a series of preseason promotional visits to local schools. We intend to meet with the PE teachers of the primary schools in our catchment area to try and gain a few new players for the coming season.



SATURDAY COMPETITION GAMES

The emphasis for players in Primary School cricket has always been on participation, having fun, and improving skills. The main focus for our teams in the 2004/05 season was on involvement in the Wellington Club competition.

As a Junior Club we look to provide an environment which nurtures a broad base of young players, from high achievers to those whose attitudes are more social. Our

mixed teams therefore include players at various levels of skill development and are pitched to attain a balance between the numbers of wins and losses.

The success for the season was our premier teams' results; they went through the whole season undefeated. The pre Christmas premiers, coached by Greg Forsythe, came from 3rd place at the end of March 2004, to win all their games in the second half of the season and to take out the competition for the first time.

The premiers in the New Year, coached by Mike Scully and with two players from the pre Christmas team continued in the same vein and also went through undefeated to lead the competition as at the end of March 2005.

In 2004/05, there were no zone tournaments with selections for the Wellington age group teams coming from a series of trials firstly at the Stadium and then a game. The Club was again well represented in the Wellington teams with 11 players in the four age groups U11 to U14 inclusive.

TOURNAMENTS

We again had a good turn out at the summer tournaments. The club focused its efforts to the Hastings tournament this summer and sent five teams, two at U11, one at U12 and two at U13.

At Hastings all the Collegians teams found the cricket a challenge and performed well with all players greatly benefiting from the experience with the Under 11 A side winning two out of its six matches, the Under 11 B none out of six, the Under 12s five out of six, and the two Under 13 sides, four out of six and two out of six respectively.

Thank you to all the parents involved in the coaching and management of the teams.

COACHING

Tony Dawbin continued on in 2004/05 in the role of Coaching Manager. This is a key position coordinating the various coaching activities of the club.

As always, we rely on parent coaches and managers to provide coaching and administration at the team level. We are indebted to them for their sustained commitment and enthusiasm.

In 2004/05, the senior club obtained the services of Aaron McCash, Senthuran Selvaratnam. Sri Rajesaker and Nishant Goyat to run our junior coaching programme

including the Saturday morning Nursery Grade, their enthusiasm and knowledge was greatly received

In 2004/05, we again ran the pre season Spring Training at the Cricket Academy This proved to be a great success with 110 players involved. The program ran on Saturdays & Sundays over an 8 week period during September and October. The program was developed for the Club by the coaching team at the Cricket Academy. Plans are already complete to run the sessions in the coming months for 2005/06.

The 'open' approach to pre-season training is consistent with the Club's policy of nurturing as broad a base as possible of the Club's young players.

As well as hard ball training, two coaching clinics for softball players were held at Anderson Park. The first, which was combined with the pre-season coaches briefing and gear uplift, was particularly well attended.

PLAYER RECOGNITION

Prior to Christmas we farewelled our Year 8 players at the Year 8 Leavers function held at Anderson Park. The Graeme Hopping Cup, awarded to a Year 8 player who has displayed special qualities such as leadership and sportsmanship during the season, went to Ben Smit.

For the third consecutive year the end of season prize-giving functions were all held at the clubrooms on the same day, Sunday April 4th, with the various grades being divided into three sessions. The event included food available from our new sponsors Wholly Bagels. The formal prize giving consisted of each player being presented with a certificate as a member of his or her team. Players of the season for each team were presented with trophies provide by Wholly Bagels.

The new format again proved a more efficient way of concluding the season from an organisational point of view, and the functions were well received and well attended by players and parents.

WEBSITE

Collegians have unquestionably the best junior cricket club website in Wellington. Thank you to Charles Thompson who does an outstanding job administering the site.

The results, match reports and ground directories continue to be heavily used This site is used by opposition teams who frequently look to see who the key players might be. Charles further updated the site to allow authorised people the ability to load information without going through him

WOMENS CRICKET

Senior Women

Amanda Cooper (Senior Women's Captain)

After winning the senior women's competition last year it was always going to be a difficult task to repeat the effort in 2004/05. Having lost various senior players to other clubs, different sports, retirement and other commitments in general, this year was very much a rebuilding phase.

The season started poorly with a number of games being lost to rain and the rest of the games simply lost through lack of application. The season went from bad to worse when whilst playing for Wellington, the team's captain, Amanda Cooper, had her arm broken. This was a season ending injury with her arm in cast for the next fourteen weeks. In her absence Amy Burgess stepped into the role of captain, leading the team to a couple of wins. However all in all the season was pretty disappointing.

It wasn't entirely bad though, there were still a couple of bright notes, with the introduction of Elizabeth Scurr and Annabelle O'Reilly into the team. Elizabeth Scurr is a current member of the Otago Sparks and after moving to Wellington to take up a job, scored a ton on debut, which was fantastic. She was then named top run scorer for the season. Annabelle O'Reilly had also done a stint playing for Otago, all be it seventeen years ago. TREASURERS REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

TREASURER'S REPORT

Ryan Standish

The surplus of \$23,479 represents another good financial result for the Club. Both the Senior and Junior Clubs recorded surpluses of \$12,355 and \$11,124 respectively.

Senior Club

Income

There was an increase in income received by the Senior club of \$7,887. The main reasons for this were:

- Active pursuing of Grants for many of the day to day operations of the club.
 Work from both Paddy and Mal led to an increase of \$4,050 for grants received when compared with last year.
- Trading Income over the bar was healthy with an increase of \$3,697. Many thanks to Dilip for all his work here.
- There was also an increase in subscriptions due to some uncertainty at the start of the season regarding grant income. This has led to an increase of \$1,555 in subscriptions received when compared with last year.

Expenditure

There was also an increase in expenditure of \$4,850 compared to 2004. The main reasons for this were:

- \$8,296 was spent on Coaches Payments for the financial year. This was to do
 with coaching for many of the Junior club teams as well. This was paid for by a
 grant provided by the Lion Foundation.
- This was off-set by a large decrease in other expenses for the Senior club of \$8,611. The big item in here last year was upgrades for the nets which we did not have to complete in 2005. It is anticipated that there will be money spent on this in 2006.
- Otherwise there have been some smaller increases in costs for the day to day running of the club. As noted earlier this was offset by the ability to get grants for a lot of the day to day operational expenditure.

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

A General Accounting Policies

The Club was registered as Wellington Collegians Cricket Club (Incorporated) with the Registrar of Incorporated Societies in December 1980. Financial Statements, which have been adopted by members at an Annual General Meeting and subject to audit, are required to be placed on public file with the Registrar on an annual basis.

- These financial statements have been prepared with application of generally accepted accounting practices as defined in the Financial Reporting Act 1993.
- (ii) The principles of measurement and reporting of financial performance and position under the historical cost method has been applied.

B Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which significantly affect the measurement of financial performance and position have been applied:

(i) Depreciation

The principal rates of depreciation used were as follows:

(ii) Sundry Debtors

Debtors and subscriptions in arrears are stated at estimated realisable value.

(iii) Stock

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

- * whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Wellington Collegians Cricket Club (Incorporated) circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand except that my work was limited as explained below. I planned and performed the audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which I considered necessary in order to provide sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial report is free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming my opinion I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of the information in the financial report.

Apart from my role as auditor I am a coach of a team in the Junior Club, whose financial results are incorporated in these accounts.

Qualified Opinion

Control over revenues prior to being recorded is limited, and there are no practical audit procedures to determine the effect of this limited control.

In my opinion, except for adjustments that might have been found to be necessary had I been able to obtain sufficient evidence concerning revenues, the financial report fairly reflects the results of operations for the year ended 31 May 2005.
