

# MINUTES OF THE 47<sup>TH</sup> WELLINGTON COLLEGIANS CRICKET CLUB INC ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING Monday 21 August 2017 Anderson Park, 7.00 pm 1. Welcome

### 3. Report back from Junior side's Sri Lankan trip

In April a team of 12 former Collegians junior players and their parents went to Sri Lanka to play cricket. Collegian's supported grant to help them raise funds – the grant was used to purchase uniforms and bags. The boys raised \$20,000 for the trip. The team spent 16 days in Sri Lanka. The weather was hot which made for some tough playing conditions, however some good scores were recorded. The boys noted that in Sri Lanka they had a rule that the first 8 overs must be pace, then all of the following overs were spin. They managed to bowl out all but one team.

They boys wanted to attend the AGM to say thanks for making grant possible they appreciated the shirts and playing strip.

### 4. Minutes from the 2016 AGM

The Minutes from the 2016 AGM were review by the meeting and agreed to. He adoption of the Minutes was moved by Chris Monigatti, seconded by Alan Orpin. The motion to approve the Minutes was adopted and carried.

### 5. Adoption of the Annual Report

Chris Monigatti spoke to his president's report. Chris noted that it was a frustrating season with the weather, but he did manage to make it to most premier and reserve games. Chris noted season highlights like Michael Garrett's 3 consecutive 100's (and the health and safety implications for the tourists in the Rose Garden) and the great day at Anderson Park for the Larry Macer Cup – with the Mayor of Wellington playing. Alan Orpin then spoke to his Chairman's report. Alan reiterated Chris' comments on the weather and the effects that it had on performances. But we did have some good performances, like Deepak Joon, Michael Garrett with the bat and Alex Sugden's 9 wickets in an innings.

Alan note that the Club Development Officer role remains largest portion of club expenditure. Last year Cricket Wellington's KPIs shifted to \$7,000 tied to performance, this highlights the importance of having a good CDO. Alan advised that Deepak achieved 90% of our KPIs.

Alan advised that we were also able to get a grant for Deepak to complete his level 3 coaching certificate. Alan noted that Deepak has decided to move on this season – in an amicable split – and our CDO is Andrew Lamb. Andrew is one of the more experienced coaches in Wellington and will also coach the senior team.

Alan acknowledge Graeme's careful stewardship of the Clubs accounts – this year we've ended up with a small profit. While small, in the current climate for sports clubs this was no small feat. Alan noted that 2016 was one of our better years in terms of charitable trust grants – a \$7,500 improvement from last year.

Alan then thanked Dillip for his hard work on club hireage and general excellent work around the club.

Alan recognised the part the Board plays in the Governance of the club as well as Chris' great photography at all the games. Alan also thanked John Chandler for his good work over the year with an expanding junior club.

Alan thanked the Captains for their good work. In particular, Alan acknowledged AJ (premier men) and Whetu (premier women) who both took over this season and did really well. Alan also thanked Emimear Richardson for her great work with the women's team. Alan thanked Kerry and Nathan for their great work this season with the reserve side, as well, Nathan put in a lot of work on the website and was the deserving receipting of the Martin Luckie Cup.

Alan noted that despite it being a difficult season, there is a lot to celebrate for the club. Chris Monigatti moved that the Annual Report be accepted, Francis Weavers seconded.

### 6. Financial Statements

Graeme spoke to the financial report. He noted that the club made a slight surplus this year after 4-5 years of deficits. This shows the significant impact of getting grant funding. The club was lucky this year in picking up a few extra grants – Sri Lankan trip, Deepak coaching cert.

A highlight in the financial report, is the junior club who are growing thier numbers. Graeme noted we have a large inventory of cricket balls – due to not using as many as expected this season with the terrible weather.

Alan moved that the Financial Report be adopted, David Boldt seconded.

### 7. Election of Officers

*Patron* – Francis Weavers confirmed that Sir Anand Satyanan is willing to continue as patron.

Francis Weavers moved that Sir Anand Satyanan be appointed patron, Alasdair McBeth seconded.

At this stage we have had no indication from Cricket Wellington that costs will increase. Chris moved that the Board be delegated authority to decide the level of subscriptions following Cricket Wellington setting the affiliation fees and any further information from Cricket Wellington , Dillip seconded, The motion was carried.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT Chris Mongetti

The 2017-2018 season began very promisingly. We had two new teams, a new coach, and several new players into the senior mens squad. Both the Premier and Reserve grade men's teams started well and looked likely to earn places in the top six. Unfortunately the Premier side could not finish off some matches from winnable positions, while the Reserves made the top six and competed well in several games. The selectors were kept busy juggling sides in the face of many unavailabilities. Our Premier women's side lost players to other sides as the association attempted to even out the grade.

Collegians continues to be one of the largest and strongest juniors clubs in the country, due to the fantastic efforts of parents and our club manager, Dilip Deva with his Sunday nursery group.

We must acknowledge the huge contribution to our club, as well as to A-list cricket in New Zealand of Michael Papps, who has announced his retirement from cricket. Michael has performed for Collegians with distinction, and given that he scored an unbeaten triple century for Wellington during the season, in a partnership of 432 with Luke Woodcock, he will remain in the record books for some time.

Behind the scenes I would like to thank the hard workers who contribute to committee meetings, or by managing, organising or scoring. Nathan Pilalis has swapped his role of Chairman with Scot Ryland from the committee. Thanks Nathan for your initiatives with Old Timers day and sponsorships, and for being willing to remain involved. We would like to thank Francis Weavers, who has managed and scored for the Premiers for several seasons, for his huge contribution, and hope to see him back at Anderson. Progress is being made on our plans to:

- redecorate the clubrooms the deck and stairs have been re-built thanks to the Wellington City Council for this essential safety work
- digitalise the club records, honours boards, and team photos
- add historic content to the new website

### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT Nathan Pilalis

The 2017-18 season was one of change for Collegians.

Alan Orpin stepped down as Chairman after leading the board successfully for a number of years along with holding many other roles with in the club over the past decade. Alan's excellent service was recognised in 2017 when he was awarded the Mike Curtis Cup for outstanding contribution to club cricket, from Cricket Wellington, and he was nominated for the Lion Foundation Volunteer of the Year at the Wellington Sport Awards. I would like to thank Alan for his huge commitment and all that he has done to ensure the success of Collegians. Alan remains on the board helping mentoring a number of members from his knowledge of all roles and responsibilities.

With the departure of Deepak Joon as Club Development Officer the club secured the services of Andrew Lamb as the new Collegians CDO and Premier Squad coach for the 2017-18 season.

Andrew hit the ground running with school visits and coaching preseason to ensure the club was in a good position leading into the start of the regular season. This flowed through to the success of Collegians achieving a majority of the KPIs set by Cricket Wellington for the season.

Andrew's services have been retained for the upcoming season and we are looking for Andrew to build on his first season successes with changes being made to the CDO KPIs with a reduction in the portion of funding that is 'at risk' reduced from \$7000 to \$5500 and a greater focus on growing the game for women participants.

With the club looking to rebuild player numbers after teams struggling to field full XIs at the end of the 2016-17 season Collegians undertook a new approach of recruitment by running a targeted Facebook campaign along with the addition of a new Website (www.wellingtoncollegians.org).

This was hugely successful and ensured Collegians was not only able to fill the teams we had in the previous season, but was able to also add two new social T20 sides.

The Collegians Board made a big effort during the season to increase the opportunities for current and past players to socialise off the field. Successful events such as the McHardy/Kerr Cup and Collegians 'Old Timers' Day along with the Xmas Party and Prize-giving ensured the club keeps past players engaged with club activities. The board will look to continue to build on this seasons success to ensure events are held regularly to keep all involved.

The performances of the Premier team throughout the season was very up and down.

Highlights included a great One Day win over Eastern Suburbs and Ben McMahon receiving the J Atkin Cup for the Best Premier Bowling Performance with 8/78.

But with the team unable to string any number of wins together the side ended up in the Premier 2 Division (Hazlett Trophy) in which they finished well off the pace and a lot of work needing to be done this coming Pre-season to ensure better results moving forward. This will be helped by the return of opening bowler Daniel Rae from his OE in the UK.

The Premier Woman remains a strong force in women's cricket in Wellington with many Collegian Women playing for the Blaze. Even though the side did not win any trophies they continue to be a leader within the teams. It was a difficult season for the women's competition, with a number of changes to increase the competitiveness of the women's game. The benefit of this was there were significantly more games played this year.

Our Premier Reserve side were in a rebuilding phase with a few senior players retiring after this season. But with offseason recruitment refilling the ranks and a new captain in Tom Ronaldson, the Reserves had a strong start to the season. Qualifying for the Alan Issac Cup (top 6 Premier Reserve teams) was testament to this strength. While the second half of the season didn't go quite as well, the Reserves have a strong base to build on for 2018/19 season.

Lastly I would like to thank the Collegians board on their hard work throughout the season to ensure the club keeps humming and building for the future. And a special mention to Scotty Ryland recently stepping up to the Chairmanship heading into the 2018-19 season.

# CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT DILIP DEVA

This season the Club entered a total of 11 teams including two extra teams in the T20 Grades. In the Men's Two Day Grade, the club entered a Men's Premier Grade (Pearce Cup Competition), the top tier senior grade in the competition.

We also entered a Premier Reserve, First Grade (Sparkle Legends), two Third Grade (Falconhawke and Chinamen) and fourth Grade (Axemen).

In the Men's other grades we also entered the One Tonne Dream, Fireraiders, and No-Ballers in the T20 Grades.

In the Women's Grades, the Club entered a Premier Women's and a Youth Girls' team.

The men's premier team was led by Captain Shreyas Debur. The premier side didn't qualify in top six placing in the first round and played in the Hazlett Trophy where they finished in 5th place.

The juniors also fielded girls' teams in Sunday leagues, Year 7 and Year 8 'representative' teams, and continued with our nursery grade for those new to cricket. Registration numbers remained consistent with last season.

WCJCC likes to prepare young cricketers for the coming season especially for Grade 5 who are new to hard ball cricket. The Spring pre season Training for hard ball junior cricketers was again taken by Liam (Casper) Jensen at the Basin Reserve nets. With 90 players signing up, the programme continues to be a success. The juniors welcomed Andrew Lamb as the new club CDO.

Pre season from an administration point of view was challenging with several changes on the local cricketing landscape. Once these hurdles were worked though the season started as planned on 4 November and didn't stop! That's right, all 16 playing days of junior cricket were completed, in what was a record summer of weather for the 2017-8 season. During the season the junior club hosted a scorers and umpires workshop, a coach's shout, team photos and prize giving. A special thank you to the WCJCC committee, who work tirelessly in the back ground to make these and many other things possible. Another big thank you to all the coaches, managers, scorers and umpires, family and friends who all help out with practices and during games.

There are changes coming to junior cricket next season with New Zealand Cricket introducing their Ages for Stages model. Here's hoping we can have another summer like the most recent, with plenty of Collegians cricket being played.

### COLLEGIANS SENIOR WOMEN Whetu Charteris

The start of this past season brought the usual challenges that we were prepared for but some new ones too. In the wake of such a weak competition last season, Cricket Wellington conducted a few focus groups throughout the winter to try and combat this. The end result being split up Wellington Blaze players to the various clubs making sure each team had equal representative players. For the last 6 or so seasons we, as



Collegians, have been fortunate having 3 full time Blaze players. Unfortunately to make sure there were even numbers we could only maintain two of these players. We were very unlucky to lose a great player in Eimear Richardson to Johnsonville to even up the numbers. I was and am still in favour though of this plan that Cricket Wellington implemented however detrimental to our own campaign. It did indeed increase both the quality of cricket played as well as the games actually played due to teams being able to field full squads.

The results from the season really speak volumes for Eimear and what a quality asset she was (and still is), Johnsonville ended up taking out both the T/20 and One Day titles when last season they couldn't field a team at all. You've obviously established that due to this we sadly did not win either competition.

From the season we placed third in both formats but that is not without some truly fantastic performances from our girls. Although we lost Eimear we were fortunate to have Liz Perry move down to Wellington for work. This meant she was able to play for the side on a more regular basis although still not as a full time player due to commitments. The senior women were also very fortunate to have New Zealand international Rachel Priest play a game or two when she was in town. We had Florence (Floss) Marshall join the club returning to Wellington from studying down in Canterbury. She proved hugely instrumental in our first half of the season setting us up for some great results. Some of her game changing figures include 138\* and then the week following from that, 124\*. We were also very fortunate to maintain a coach in, Liam (Casper) Jensen. His expertise again proving extremely valuable and was a key component for a number of the players honing in on their abilities and really progressing.

On reflection and only on occasion, we were able to boast a much stronger side than the opposition but this weren't true of the matches that mattered or for the majority which was extremely disappointing.

We managed to schedule 10 games this season which is a huge improvement from last years 3. Sure there were still some defaults but only 2 from us which is again a drastic improvement. Of that 10, 5 were T/20s. We won 2 and unfortunately lost 3. 2 of these 3 loses were by default as we were unable to get a team together, one of those two games was the same weekend as the worlds most famous (I'm open to debate) red head, Ed Sheeran playing in Auckland, I still maintain that club cricket is more important but again, debatable. Liz Perry had an extremely classy T/20 opener against Hutt districts on the beautiful Basin Reserve scoring an impressive 117.

We played a total of 5 40 over matches and in similar fashion to the T/20 competition we won 2 and lost 3, at least we were consistent in that regard. We were once again unlucky with a few of the most crucial games coinciding with some popular weekends away for our side. I am extremely positive about not having to default a game in the one day format though despite low numbers. As previously mentioned we had some stellar performances emerge from the one day competition including a back to back centuries from new comer, Florence Marshall. The one day competition was well run this year with all clubs fielding competitive teams making for a much stronger competition. We were certainly in with a chance at making it to the final after the first few rounds and we too were optimistic. Sadly we weren't able to field a full strength side in a "must win" game vs Hutt Districts to secure a spot in the final which essentially let us down. But all in all both the T/20 and one day campaigns were far more successful than last year. We look to build off the back of these performances for next season and look to go even further in both competitions which is certainly achievable.

As I get to the end I realise I've waffled on a lot about the batting performances and given no credit to the bowlers...what's new though. A ball park figure but I'd say we had about 20 players (if not more) bowl for us this season. We had our very own up and comer, Beth Molony, make her debut for the Wellington Blaze this season and take her first domestic wicket. Beth has worked extremely hard over the season, she has a huge amount of potential and one of the best attitudes I've ever seen. We also had Caitlin King play for us more consistently this season who also made her Wellington Blaze debut. Now I don't mean to toot my own horn (obviously I do) but I was the one who actually brought her along to Blaze training as a mere fill in fielder for our open wicket sessions. Her skills and natural ability then shone through and caught the eye of head coach, Christie Van Dyk. She's our very own Nathan Lyon I suppose you could say. Aside from these two making waves we also had Isla Shanks have a very impressive season for us. Isla is a player who had played for the Collegians youth side and been brought up to senior women's in the last two seasons and has transitioned with ease. Isla picked up a collective 6 wickets for the season and was a pivotal part of our squad this past (and I'm sure future) season.

Throughout the past season we very much struggled once more with our commitment as a team. We had 5-6 different youth girls play for us throughout the season. Of those 6, we had at least 2 most if not every game so that we were able to then field a side. Things however do look very promising going into the 2018/19 season. This is hoping we're able to maintain the current core members of the squad for next and promote a few of the youth players into the side. Discussions have already taken place with the youth coach around what youth members will be eligible and willing to take that next step up to Senior Womens Cricket. ### TREASURER'S REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Graeme Sugden TREASURER

### Overview

The 2017-18 season resulted in a surplus of \$1,826, very similar to last year. The operating cash surplus was \$4,973, (LY \$5,954), and there were no capital purchases during the season. Grants were down on last year but it should be noted that part of this was due to three of the grants last year that were one off grants. Thanks again to Alan who has been able to maintain this source of revenue.

Subscriptions were up this year as a result of two additional T20 teams. Junior subs were in line with last year, but they did have a 60% increase in pre season revenue. Pavilion trading was the other area of improvement up 60% on the prior year, with expenses not increasing to the same extent and thus a healthy surplus resulted.

Sponsorship income is regrettably non existent with sponsors wanting to see a return on their investment, although this is always an area that the Board is trying to get some traction.

Expenses were in line with 2017. The CDO costs make up much of the administration and management cost. As noted last year the main concern going forward is how we fund our CDO role, as the Cricket Wellington contribution does not totally cover that cost. Some funding was received by way of a grant to assist. Cricket Wellington funding is changed for the coming season with funding extending the duration of the CDO role, but without a commensurate increase in funding.

For the season ahead the Club is budgeting for a small surplus, assuming a level of grant funding similar to previous, and with the knowledge of securing the One Club contract with Cricket Wellington.le. Whilst we are in a financially healthy position in the short to medium term, we need to continually explore opportunities that will enable us to prosper long term.

### Outcomes from the independent financial review

In accordance with the guidelines from the Institute of Chartered Accountants and our constitution, this year's independent financial review was undertaken by Davmor Business Services.
