

Scott spoke to the reports. Members discussed the change in the CDO programme.

5. Financial Statements

Club made a small surplus. Grants were down, the 2020-21 season will be very difficult to get grant funding due to reduction in gambling funds for grant organisations. Cricket Wellington have removed affiliation fees for this season. David moved that we adopt the annual report, Dil seconded this.

- Management Committee

 Scott nominated Tom Ronaldson, seconded by Jordan.
 Tom Ronaldson nominated Tom Rutherford, Avi seconded.
- Delegates to Cricket Wellington AGM James moved that Scott, Dil, Graeme, Roger, Alan are our delegates. Doug seconded.
- Financial Reviewer Graeme moved that we delegate authority for this to the board. Seconded by David.

7. Club Subscriptions

Scott noted the removal of Cricket Wellington affiliation fees means we can reduce subs for playing members. Senior subs from \$315 per player to \$200, 2 Day from \$2,470 to \$1,700, T20 from \$1,750 to \$1,200. Students and Women from \$190 to \$130. Subscription reductions will be invoiced as a discount. This is a pass through of approximately 80% of the discount, the remainder retained as recognition of the reduced likelihood of receiving grant funding. Club discussed retaining some of the funding. Liz as CW delegate noted the objective is to support club sustainability. David moved to delegate this decision ultimately to the board, within the broad parameters of what the club has discussed tonight. Tom Rutherford seconded.

8. General Business

The club discussed the senior squad set up and developments. Discussed Women's cricket and keeping the Blaze separate from club cricket. Liz noted that CW will give their blessing to any Blaze players wanting to play men's cricket.

Meeting closed at 8:04.

So, this is the end of my three year stint as president of Wellington Collegians Cricket Club, and I can honestly say it's been a pleasure and a privilege to have served in this position over this period of time. While being president is in reality not the most taxing of roles, it did put me in prime position to observe how all the hard work that goes on behind the scenes and off the field can translate into improved individual, team and club performances on the field. Many thanks to Dilip for considering me for the role all those three years ago, I've thoroughly enjoyed it.

Many congratulations to the Senior Women's team on winning your one-day competition this season, and commiserations on your close loss in the final of the T20 competition against Upper Hutt. This was a hard fought game and was thoroughly enjoyed by the sizeable crowd who turned up on a sunny Sunday at the home of cricket to be entertained by a tense encounter between two very competitive teams that was only decided on the very last ball of the game.

And very well done to the Senior Reserves this season for your comprehensive string of victories which saw you immediately promoted back up a grade after last season's disappointing relegation. This was achieved on the back of a combination of your skipper Damo's wisdom and experience and numerous outstanding individual and team performances which saw you comfortably overcome most of your opposition.

Off the field, the club's committee continued their outstanding work in running the club smoothly and efficiently. I have never failed to be impressed by the sheer amount and quality of the work done by club chairman Scott Ryland over the last three years, and so I suppose it's understandable that he has decided to take a step back for next year to dedicate more time to his life outside of the cricket club, while still remaining on the committee. Fortunately the role of chairman will pass on to Sam Grayling who is equally capable in his own way and will ensure a large degree of continuity as he steps up from his position as club secretary.

Some of the issues that will keep the club and the committee occupied over the next and coming seasons include the potential merger with the University club, the next instalment of the Collegians Hall of Fame, and a potential clubhouse sharing arrangement during the winter months. Hopefully the committee is able to successfully address these and other issues for the overall betterment of the club and to secure its future in the coming years.

The Collegians junior club remains the largest and strongest in Wellington and continues to thrive under the more than capable management of Brian Steele. Many thanks to Brian and the junior board for all their hard work, and thanks too to all the parents who have contributed in various ways.

Apart from the above mentioned title winning performances, my two main highlights of the season were the following:

- The Senior team captaincy and leadership of Jordan McDermott. All his decisions on behalf of the team were well-considered and thoughtful, and he also led really well by example. The major plus for me though is that he'll be back as captain for a second season, the first time that this has happened during my term as president. It can't be emphasised enough how important it is for a team to maintain continuity of captain and squad, and as a result I confidently expect a significantly improved showing from the Senior team next season.
- Attending the club prizegiving. This was a thoroughly enjoyable evening's entertainment, and reminded me of many a rowdy Saturday night in the clubrooms back in my heyday of the 80s and 90s. Many thanks to Andrew Coppersmith and the social committee for their efforts in promoting the social aspect of the club this season, and hopefully the club's members will be inspired to replicate the great atmosphere of this event on various occasions in the coming season.

In finishing, all the very best to the Collegians club and all its members for an enjoyable and successful 2021-22 season, and I trust the incoming president enjoys their time in the role as much as I have done. Thanks for having me.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT Scott Ryland

Reflecting on last season, given the events of the last year or so, I am reminded how very lucky we were to be able to complete a full season of cricket with no COVID related interruptions. Although the weather did kindly give us a few breaks during the season. Last year's cancelled prizegiving meant that we were lucky enough to celebrate the great cricket played at Collegians twice. Once at the beginning of the season, where we raced through the quickest award awarding in Collegians history, and a more drawn out affair in March to celebrate an excellent season.

While I got to experience the mid-table mediocrity that FalconHawk(e) are renowned for, not everyone was so lucky. Our Premier Reserve Men's side remained undefeated before Christmas and only lost 1 game all season, in no small part thanks to the tireless leadership of Damien Grant. The Ressies comfortably and deservingly topping the grade and gaining promotion back to division 3. Not to be outdone, our Premier Women's side were very nearly as hard to beat, eventually winning the Joy Lamason cup for the 1-day competition and narrowly losing to Hutt Districts in the Maureen Peters Plate T20 final in a nail biting finish at Anderson Park.

Our Premier Men were well led by Jordan McDermott and Subhash Choudhary in their first years and captain and coach. Both achieved a lot in their first years in the role and I am looking forward to seeing our Premier Men's team develop further with some very exciting young talent in the squad. Sadly we had to say goodbye to Akash, our overseas player for the last 2 years – who was offered an opportunity to return to India that was too good to pass up. I'd like to sincerely thank Akash for all he's given Collegians in the last 2 years. I know he'll be sorely missed with both bat and ball, as well as for his excellent coaching with the junior club.

Across the club there were some very notable individual performances, highlighted by Alex Sugden taking a hattrick in the Premier Reserve grade, and Shivang Choudhary scoring a huge 161 for the Premier Men. Quick fire 100's were also scored in the Prem's by Cam Meads (134 from 108 balls) and Louis Worthington (100 from 79 balls at number 8!) – I am certain this will not be the last time we see either name on the honours board. Recognition also needs to be given to the not often seen 5 dismissals from a wicket keeper honours board criteria – with Jordan McDermott taking 4 catches and a stumping against Petone.

Stretch has had another excellent year with the junior club – following on from an excellent spring training, our junior club has grown to over 300 cricketers. Including a full pathway for women's cricket from nursery grade to premier cricket.

I would also like to extend a big thank you to our major sponsor Cricket Express who have come on board this year, and for the next three years. This is an exciting relationship for Collegians, and I would encourage all Collegians to pay Kev and the team a visit in the spring - because I'm pretty sure you're just a new stick away from 2021-22 being your year. Also, look out for some sharp new playing kit across the club coming real soon.

I also need to sincerely thank Roger Kinsella for this service over the last 3 years as club president. Dodger is a wealth of excellent cricket knowledge and, more importantly, tales of the glory days. We have been very grateful to have him serve as President in my time as chairman.

I do also want to extend a special thanks to Jimmy Lawler. Jimmy was named by Cricket Wellington in their Volunteer XI for 2020-21 – and rightly so. Jimmy has been an integral part of our Premier squad scoring nearly every game and in the off season never letting us forget when the Crusaders win.

A final thanks to everyone who volunteered, captained, turned up every week or just came along to fill in once or twice. You are what makes Collegians such a warm and welcoming club and an absolute pleasure to play with and for.

Annual Report 2020/21

It has been an excellent year for Wellington Collegians cricket. In the height of COVID we shared that we would maintain fees at the level of the previous year and do more with your contributions. Amongst the many highlights we achieved were:

- Our 'stretch' goal of 300 cricketers (Actual 310 up 25 from prior year);
- New shirts in Nursery grade as we look to drive early adoption of cricket;
- Kelburn school leading the way in new Nursery to Year 4 sign ups;
- A record 8 sides in Hawkes Bay January Years 5 8 tournaments;
- 8 of our Year 8 cricketers selected from a Porirua tournament;
- Year 8 reps vs. Women's U19s at the home of cricket Anderson Park;
- A Year 9-10 combined side competing in December in our colours; and
- A Girls year 9-10 side meaning Collegians is one of few (if any) Wellington clubs to have a female cricket pathway from Nursery grade to Senior Women's cricket.

Thanks to sterling Grade Coordinator and Coach work we achieved strong returning numbers. There was also strong recruitment in Years 2-5 which benefitted from Cricket Wellington getting programs into our key schools in Term 3. In all we fielded 34 sides in 2020/21 including reps.

The year was built off a hugely successful Spring Training run by Will Marshall. For the first time we fielded over 100 players (with nearly all of Years 5 and 6) working under the tutelage of Club Pro Akash Sivan and long-time Collegians coaching legend Liam "Casper" Jensen.

Under the leadership of Nicky Ward we introduced Hoodies with take-up of 1 in 2 players (over 150 sold). We also learned from our friends of the oval ball code and Brooklyn cricket and purchased Ribbons to recognise good play and sporting behaviour across our community for both sides in each game. This has yielded further goodwill and was successfully trialled by Year 6 at Hawkes Bay.

We refined gear bags with the introduction of a gear library and gift(s) through Will Marshall's guidance. This also allowed Collegians to donate pre-loved gear to deserving communities including Glenview school in Porirua East. The pending slimmer bags coming in 2021/22 should save a few coaches shoulders and backs and lead to a more fit for purpose hardball training focused kit.

Nursery grade took a revamp under former Juniors Chair Grant Richardson, Club Captain Dilip Deva, and Grade Coordinator Dylan Jorgensen. The skills of specific coaches were introduced alongside shirts. Nursery grade is the envy of many clubs and the foundation for cricketers who want to learn skills and get the best out of their talent and dedication.

We meanwhile deepened our relationships with Cricket Wellington, Wellington College and University Cricket Club. We collaborate with University with women's cricket and they graciously hosted four hardball sides training plus allowed us to use their facilities for rep trials.

In the year just completed we recognised a further 3 former players into our team names. We now also have the Bert Kortlangs, Ima Lamasons, and the James Franklins. We hope to have a second Hall of Fame event at Wellington College to sit within a wider group of sporting recognition in Q4 2021.

In December we thanked the wise counsel of Mark Hargreaves, Andrew "Mr Tournaments" Crombie and huge energy and event (and hoodie) success of Nicky Ward in a Year 8 function in the clubrooms. We meanwhile welcomed Fiona Best (Events), Dylan Jorgensen (Nursery GC) and lent on Senior Chair Scott Ryland (who also tirelessly coached the Year 5-8 Jalapeños) and Tom Ronaldson (interim Digital Communications) from the Senior section of our club

I would like to thank Cricket Wellington including for waiving affiliation fees in the 2020/21 season as COVID relief and in particular Matt Wills as our liaison officer and Jaimee Baily for the schools program. For those either without a winter code or with sufficient energy for more I draw your attention to Winter Saturday afternoon www.worldseriescricket.co.nz run by Robbie Kerr.

In the year ahead we hope to make progress towards new / improved nets at Anderson Park. When this is actioned, we will appreciate your indulgence in our fundraising efforts (think jars of peanut butter), and the Hall of Fame event. We appreciate our community of coaches, umpires, scorers, selectors, supporters, washing whites experts and all associating in making our game educative and fun for our players.

The Committee is in good heart, albeit operating with a lean but dedicated crew. We would particularly benefit from digital marketing guidance to share the joys of cricket and playing it from our base of Anderson Park. People do not need to have been cricketers themselves but need only to understand what the game can provide to our players and the community. Please reach out to me or other members of the committee listed below if you share our passion.

TEAM REPORTS

COLLEGIANS PREMIER MEN – Jordan McDermott

In the season just been, we got off to a hiss and a roar winning our first completed game (thanks Wellington weather) but with some further abandoned games (3 in total) and a string of injuries before Christmas, we were unable to get into top gear and pull together winning performances. 2 wins, 3 abandoned and 5 losses in the one-day competition. However, this was no excuse for us as a Premier Men's side and we had plenty of room for improvement going into the two-dayers.

For the two-dayers post-Christmas we had 2 winning draws, 1 losing draw and 2 losses. We worked hard in the two-dayers and had some exceptionally competitive performances. I really felt this came out of the hunger to improve after the one-dayers. The squad trained hard and would show up week in week out and I really appreciated having a large group of lads that consistently showed up for training twice a week. While we didn't get the results we wanted, the two-dayers certainly showed we can play. We scored the most runs in the two-day competition compared to the other teams and that gives me great confidence for the next upcoming season with our talent pool.

Notable performances:

- Shivang Choudhary 161 (two-day), 586 runs @ 32.56, 15 wickets @ 31.87. Still known as the team pest in his youthful age with plenty of questionable chat. He certainly has matured a lot this season topping the run scoring chart having cemented himself in the top order and he had a huge amount of energy to burn in the field. Another season like this for Shivang will only help him knock on the door higher up for furthering his cricket career.
- 2. Senthil Selvaratnam 5/49 (one-day), 5/78 (two-day), 33 wickets @ 19.73. It was fantastic having Senty back playing for the club again. He was invaluable with his spin bowling tying down an end, formulating plans and usually executing to a tee. The number of times I heard "yeah mate one more over and I've got him" never got old. His experience and leadership advice were very sound when needed too.

3. Tom McDougall – 5/28 (two-day), 5/59 (two-day), 31 wickets @ 19.73.

This man is like fine wine, only getting better with age. He played 4 less games than last season and took more wickets. His ability to hit the same line and length while nicking off all sorts for 20+ overs in a day when required is unrivalled in Wellington. Tom is a great asset to the team leading from the front with the ball.

4. Akash Suresh – 96* (two-day), 550 runs @ 27.50, 11 wickets @ 41.36. An impressive second season with Collegians with the bat and adding some leg spin into the mix too got him nabbing a few key wickets. He was constantly working hard instilling a strong drive to be the best wherever he is playing. Akash will be missed next season after heading back home to India.



5. Jordan McDermott – 92 (two-day), 524 runs @ 29.11. Not much to say here really.

There is always plenty to reflect on at the end of a season and it can be hard picking out the key moments that explain why we play cricket.

A couple of additional mentions here for some lads that filled in the core of our team this season were Cam Meads and Louis Worthington. I have never seen anyone hit a six as big as Cam did at Ando, several times in fact. Louis once again has carried on expressing himself further with his group of mates coming to hang out at Ando whenever he's making an appearance.

- Cam was new to the club this season and was our 4th highest run scorer this year with 485 runs in the middle order, narrowly missing out on that glorified 5-hundy club. He scored a maiden ton for the club (134 runs off 108 balls) and he quite fairly took the most prized honours off me this season by destroying bowlers' aspirations smashing the most bombs for the season (23 sixes). He can bowl a good nut too occasionally and has outrageous hands in the field and just loves cricket.
- Louis is certainly finding his groove as a Premier batsman. Ending the season on 342 runs having improved from last season. He smashed his maiden ton (100 runs off 79 balls) against North City of which about 60 runs were with our 11th batter. Also, he's consistently another safe pair of hands in the field and stops 20+ runs in the cover region whenever he's hunting.



Our bowling unit this year constantly changed as we had a number of injuries almost spreading faster than the recent pandemic. It was certainly tough for the lads. With that said:

- Harley Smith was most impressive coming into the Premier team this season. He initially came into the side as a batting all-rounder, who quickly showed his bowling was more useful once he figured good line and length made it easy and ended up nabbing 13 wickets. He's super eager to learn and pursue higher personal goals.
- Carne Ashworth had a strong pre-season and was always one of the first at training throughout the season. He always put the team first and would send down some useful overs but didn't quite get the rewards he was seeking this season.

The highlight of the season for me was holding a very strong Eastern Suburbs team (who were relegated last season to the Hazlett Trophy) to a draw in the two-dayers, making them spend

100 overs in the field on day two and listening to them whinge about it. They wiped the rest of the competition clean apart from us with the red ball. I was blown away by Scott Oldham's 27 off 140 balls, with his sheer determination not to give up his wicket. Scott's innings here had hints of inspiration taking strike rate notes from our very own quiz master Avi Singh.

It was certainly a challenging season at times nonetheless, the commitment and dedication from everyone being at training and the social events made it all worth it. We used a total of about 28 players across the season, with 16 playing 5 or more games, which is a high score from Collegians for the last few seasons I think. Several new players in the squad helped us develop some strong depth.

I really enjoyed the challenge stepping up as a new captain for the 20/21 season and working with Subhash Choudhary (Coach) but I must send out a few big thank-yous to Damien Grant (Premier Reserve captain), Tom Ronaldson (Premier Manager) Nathan King (Reserves team manager) and Scott Ryland (Club Chairman). You all were amazing in different aspects from helping with figuring out availabilities, selections and being a sounding board for me and showing me what it means when you play for Wellington Collegians. Lastly a big thank you to my loving partner Anna and our young son for supporting me with leading the side this season.

We had over 30 players represent Wellington Collegians this season, including 3 current and 3 former Blaze players. We welcomed 3 players from Norths; Xara Jetly, Dani Brearton and Ivy Robinson + former Auckland U19 rep Phoebe Jones.



Joy Lamason Trophy (1-day competition): The season started off with the Joy Lamason Trophy (1-day competition) where the team went through undefeated beating Hutt District in the final round to claim the trophy. Florence Marshall's 85* and Anna Martin's 84 were the competitions 2 highest scores.

- Florence Marshall lead the way with the bat scoring 331 runs with 2 half centuries and top score of 85* against Upper Hutt.

TREASURER'S REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 2020-21 Graeme Sugden TREASURER Overview The 2020-2021 season was free from Covid, and ended up delivering the Club a financial bonus as there were no ground fees and we also received support from Sport NZ. In addition we benefited from our new arrangement with Cricket Express.

As a result we ended the year with a surplus of \$16,952. However this should be viewed as a one off, and is achieved with a significant contribution from the Junior Club who have a strong participation base, whereas the senior club struggles with numbers, with one less team than the previous year.

The most significant saving was on ground fees which saved \$10k, but this was a one off, so the result, together with other factors needs to be viewed in that light.

Grant money was in line with last year and we benefited from having Cricket Express as a sponsor. It would help considerably if we were able to get someone else on board, particularly as grant money is not a secure line of funding, given that that the pokie industry is a sinking one with no new licences being granted.

For the Senior Club the two major expenses are coaching and cricket balls. The coaching arrangement works well and fortunately this cost is much less than the previous arrangement of two years ago with the CDO arrangement, which was not sustainable.

The Board is mindful of the condition of the nets and a proposal to upgrade them is currently being considered. This will require a substantial investment, for which we will need considerable funding in addition to the Club's own reserves.

For the season ahead we will be looking at a breakeven position but our ability to obtain grant money could be an issue as already noted. Senior subs are at a level that the Board are comfortable with and any increase would likely be a deterrent to any growth in membership, so the club continues to explore ways of financing the club.

We look forward to the season ahead.
