

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### David Boldt

The 2023-24 season underlined the challenges and opportunities Collegians will face in the years ahead. Our stars were our senior women's team, now freed from last year's marriage of convenience to Johnsonville. We finished third in Division 1, but Collegians is a team on the rise, and I have no doubt we will be title contenders next season. The pathways and infrastructure the club has put in place for women and girls has been superbly organised and are now paying real dividends. A particular thanks goes to the brilliant Nicole Baird and Beth Molony for their on-field leadership, and to Becs Newell and Ivy Robinson who have helped build a squad that is constantly being refreshed with outstanding talent. They have done a great job of ensuring that everyone, whatever their level of ability, finds a team they enjoy playing for.

The Premier men did not return triumphantly to Hazlett Trophy, finishing mid-table in Division 3, while the difficult season experienced by the Reserves and Thirds showed that maintaining a senior squad with enough depth to challenge for promotion is difficult when you are no longer a Premier club. Once again, the club owes a huge debt of gratitude to Damien Grant, Chris Bolton and Nathan King for their tireless work putting competitive teams on the park every week, and for bedding in the strong team culture the squad has shown ever since Damo and Chris took the helm.

Scott Oldham worked immensely hard, as he always does, and the team was still in with a chance of promotion going into the last month of the season. But we can be under no illusion that the journey back to Premier status will be easy. When we do re-enter Hazlett – and we will, it is only a matter of time – it will be with the squad that wants to play for Collegians because we provide a superb all-round cricketing experience, being a Club that is well-run with a culture players want to be part of.

Those qualities – good organisation, a positive and supportive culture, a place for keen cricketers whatever their age or level of ability, and a commitment to playing cricket as it should be played – have always been Collegians' strengths. That is why our junior club continues to be the best organised, and among the biggest, in Wellington. And while it is always challenging to persuade cricketers to return after they leave school, we can be proud of the way we send kids off to college with the best possible grounding in the skills and temperament they need to form a lifelong love of the game.

And the senior club, both men's and women's, provides teams that cater for everyone. The Hoggs, Falconhawk(e) and One Tonne Dream remain strong, with loyal and passionate squads. The consolidation and rebuilding phase the Club is now in the midst of will be fuelled, at least in part, by players we welcome, who find they love the Club and its culture, and bring along their friends.

The Board has worked tirelessly to meet the challenges the last few years have thrown at us. We are very fortunate to have a Chairman as dedicated as Simon Petre, who has worked so hard since he stepped up in the most difficult of circumstances two years ago. Simon was a worthy winner of the Martin Luckie Trophy this year.

Our finances are as good as they have been for a long time, which is a considerable achievement in difficult economic times. Adam Tee has been outstanding as Treasurer. And Euan McNaught has performed admirably in the often-thankless role of Secretary. The Club will miss him, both on and off the field, when he heads to Auckland later this year.

It has been a privilege to serve as President for the last three years. This is a wonderful Club to be part of, and while the next three years promise to be just as challenging as the last, I know Collegians is in the best of hands.

## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

This was to be my second season as chairman and, with it, I was keen to start making progress towards our goals and moving the club forward after our relegation from prems two seasons ago. Unfortunately, we have continued to feel the impact across the senior club of the relegation, and the fallout has been heavier than expected.

Coming into the season, we had men's teams in divisions 3, 4, and 6, as well as Division 1 T20. However, early numbers suggested that we could form a third Division 6 team. Unfortunately, players moving on and fluctuating availabilities made this difficult. We had several defaults in Division 6 due to numbers. Our reserves really struggled, resulting in another relegation to Division 5. Going forward, this will pose a real challenge as the club continues to push for promotion back into Division 2. We have seen the importance of having a premier side for recruitment across the entire club. Despite having one of the biggest and most established junior clubs in Wellington with a large catchment area, school leavers continue to head to other clubs that offer premier cricket, regardless of where they played as a kid.

As part of our rebuild, we brought in new members to invigorate the board and started delegating defined roles and responsibilities. I'd like to thank the board for their work throughout the season and commitment to the club administration. The board members are volunteering their time for the betterment of the club, and for that, I'm thankful that we have such a passionate group. I'm confident that as we work through the winter, we will put together a strong plan for the upcoming season. I'd like to extend a special mention to David Boldt who has finished his term as president. In his time, he's provided valuable insight and advice to not only the board but myself when navigating the chairman role.

This season we also say farewell to Nathan King who has been a fierce advocate for our senior squad over the years. Week in, week out, he would work away making sure our teams had enough players for the weekend and his efforts in this area are going to be greatly missed. I want to give a huge thanks to Kingi for his efforts over the years and hope he enjoys having stress free Friday nights going forward.

This season, we were pleased to award our Cricket Express scholarship to Lily Campbell from our premier women's side. This Scholarship is awarded to a Premier or Representative player from Collegians who exhibits leadership qualities both on and off the field, demonstrates outstanding cricket skills and performance, and shows commitment to personal and team development. The recipient of the scholarship receives a full gear package to the value of \$1500! Lily has played for Collegians for a few years now and has racked up quite a cricketing CV already. Not only is she a member of Tawa College 1st XI, the Wanderers, and Collegians Premier women, but she has also captained Wellington U13, U15 and has been a member of the Wellington U17 & U19 rep side. It was great to see Lily out there smashing it around with her new gear in Collegian's yellow colours. I look forward to awarding this scholarship again next season, so stay tuned for details on the applications.

Our women's and girls' pathway continues to grow and strengthen by the year. We are now able to offer cricket for girls from nursery grade all the way through to premier women. A huge shoutout to Becs Newell and Ivy Robinson who have been the driving force behind our pathway programme. We are already seeing the results, with some girls making their debut for our premier women's side. This season in the seniors, we were able to field both a premier women's side and a team in Division 2, all in new playing kits. Scott Ryland also continues to coach our Jalapenos youth girls' side, of which I hope to be supporting the girls through the Jalapints & Jalapinots event soon, Scott.

This season, we ran our second golf fundraiser for the club. In the current funding environment, it's becoming increasingly hard to come by grants. So, events like our golf day are critical to our finances. The golf fundraiser has become the biggest event we host each year and to date has been incredibly successful. I'd like to thank those that helped me with the organization of the day: Nicole Baird, Adam Tee, Andrew Coppersmith, and Scott Ryland who single-handedly catered the entire event. Also, a huge thanks to all of our sponsors on the day; without them, it isn't possible, and I look forward to another event this season.

Harley was at the top of our batting leader board with 513 runs (43 AVG, 103 SR). The Collegians Reserve side faced a tough 2023/24 season, winning only two of 17 matches and suffering relegation by an extremely narrow 0.9 points, the barest of margins.

Player turnover weakened the team, with promotions, departures, and absences affecting consistency and competitiveness. While better in Timed games with two wins, overall, the inability to set or chase targets led to undue pressure on bowlers and resulted in some high-scoring defeats.

Truthfully, we struggled all season to compete in a decent standard Division 4, particularly in the One Day portion where we didn't secure a win and picked up a few heavy defeats. We only really competed to win one OD fixture, a narrow 3-run loss to Norths. However, we showed improvement in the Timed games, bagging two victories and being more competitive overall.

While this report may be a gloomy look back over a season of struggle and ultimately relegation, it would be remiss to not mention the positives. We took the fight to survive right up to the last day of the season, and if we'd have picked up one extra bonus point, we'd have stayed up. That we were able to put ourselves in a position to stay up at all until the final match is admirable. There were a few really good individual performances, and some players had a great season overall. The spirit of the team was always positive, constructive, collegial, and dare I say it – fun (at times!).

Despite the challenges, I'm proud that the team stayed together, didn't splinter, kept our heads up all season, and fought until the final day, very nearly avoiding relegation.

New to the nest were Jeetan and lanto, offering excitement at the bowling crease and with the bat. Ianto Mann was one half of the only Father-son combo featured this season. Returning to the nest from our youth development arm, Angus "The Arm" Bartlett self-rescued his career from Auckland. And between the new and young, we were delighted to see Adam, Benjamin, Jules, Matt Ritchie, Biggers, Geoff, and Drew all turn out for us during the season in all their majestic plumage.

The season started solidly, two games with big scores and a long-awaited return to the honours board, JJA Duffy with the season's highest score of 107. Sadly, the counterbalance was Angus's broken arm whilst fending off a sharp short-pitched ball. Our third match was memorable for all the wrong reasons, getting thumped at Liardet Park. A 50-run partnership for the 9th wicket followed up by some great bowling and catches saw our third win of the season. They had lost 5 wickets in three overs. Two more overs unfolded before they were all-out, Geoff finishing with a remarkable 5/8. Our chase saw us a few down at drinks, KJ fighting hard with his longest and highest FalconInnings. But then the olde guard of Ozwald and Dreamy brought us home with a superb unbroken 87 run 7th wicket partnership. A super solid FalconWin.

Come late summer, we had a great return match against Stokes Valley, who had beaten us in the first round. Some good bowling by the Bartlett twins, Ben's Friend Tim (BFT) and S Sparkle positioned us well. Treacle found some form but a combination of Adam's excellent work behind the stumps and 70\* tipped the scales. O Mann was once again there at the end, sharing a 61-run unbroken 5th wicket stand to bring us home by 6 wickets.

After nearly a decade since our last fixture at the Home of Cricket, Anderson Park, we did the occasion justice with an excellent fighting victory. Treacle brought up his maiden FalconFifty in a 122-run 3rd wicket stand with The Full Package, who scored his second sensational FalconFifty, tormented throughout by lingering memories of his uncharacteristic fielding, boosted by constant reminders from the sideline. #### TREASURER'S REPORT

Adam Tee

#### Overview

The overall financial result is a positive one, with the Club making a surplus of \$15,200 (before depreciation) for the 2023/24 season. This result was shared between the Senior and Junior sections of the Club, with both making an operational surplus. My main objective for my first season in the role was to stabilise the financial result for the Senior section and to break-even. Unbudgeted revenue, predominantly from club room hire, was the main driver for this achievement. Although the overall result is favourable, we have seen downward trends from the prior year across most revenue streams because of reduced Junior numbers and less Senior social teams.

#### Revenue

Most revenue streams saw a downwards trend this year. Two less senior social teams and reduced junior numbers resulted in fewer playing subscriptions than the prior year from both the Seniors and Juniors. Bar sales, fundraising, and donations all followed suit.

On the other hand, we had a very strong year of facilities bookings. The Club benefited from a greater number of individual hires and LiveNation's use of the club rooms during their "On a Good Day" event.

We were unsuccessful in our bid for grant funding from the Pelorus Trust this year, but we were successful with bids for grants from the Lion Foundation, at the same value as prior year, and New Zealand Community Trust, which we did not receive in 2022/23.

As can be seen from the trends over the past few years, income from grant funding and hiring of the Club's facilities can be variable and are very dependent on factors outside of our control.

We currently rely heavily on our Members to fund the activities of the club, with less than 30% of our revenue (excluding interest) coming from sources outside of our player base. Although grant funding and sponsorships are hard to come by in the current climate, the Club should be looking to utilise all contacts to spread our sources of revenue, limit the risks of volatility and maintain its future financial stability.

## **Expenditure**

The Club's largest fixed expenses, being clubroom running expenses and ground fees, remained stable year-on-year. Coaching & training fees dropped thanks to finding alternative training facilities and the reduction in Cricket Wellington funding for women's coaching. We saw an increase in cricket ball costs wholly due to the number of games played by all teams with the good summer weather.

At the beginning of the season, the Board reached out to all senior captains to find out what was needed by the teams and as a result we invested in a new senior women's playing kit and over \$2,000 of training gear across the senior sides.

All other expenses stayed relatively stable, though we will start to see some of the operating costs gradually increase over the coming season.

#### **Outlook**

In the 2024/25 season, we will see significant increases in the cost of senior cricket balls due to changes in Cricket Wellington's rules. We will strive to obtain funding to cover these expenses, supported by current ball stocks which will help protect against the impact of these changes in the short term. We will also see moderate increases in some operating and playing-related costs with Cricket Wellington increasing affiliation fees for the first time since 2019.

The Board wants to avoid passing these costs on to members and therefore the Club must make a significant effort to investigate and maximise available opportunities through grant funding, sponsorships, and events such as the annual golf day.

#### **Closing words**

As stated previously, we have had a positive year financially with both sections of the Club making an operating surplus. The Club is in a strong financial position, with a healthy value of assets. To maintain this position, we must not be complacent, plan for the future and explore other revenue streams so that we can confidently invest funds back in the Club whenever needed.

# The Wellington Collegians Cricket Club Incorporated Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30 April 2024

#### 1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## **Reporting Entity**

These are the financial statements of The Wellington Collegians Cricket Club Incorporated (the 'Society'). The Society is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The financial statements of the Society are special purpose financial statement prepared in accordance with the accounting policies detailed below.

These financial statements have not been audited but have been subject to an accountants review engagement.

#### **Measurement Base**

These financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis unless otherwise stated.

## **Specific Accounting Policies**

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

#### **Grants Revenue**

Grants are included in operating revenue when earned. If particular conditions are attached to a grant that would require it to be repaid if these conditions are not met, then the income received is recorded as a liability under Income in Advance to the extent of the conditions not yet met at the reporting date.

#### **Donations**

Donations are recognised as revenue on the reciept of cash.

#### **Accounts Receivable**

Accounts Receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off through the Statement of Financial Performance when they are no longer considered recoverable.

#### **Fixed Assets & Depreciation**

Fixed Assets are recognised at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using rates that will write off assets over their useful lives. Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets are taken into account in determining the operating result for the year.

#### **Inventories**

The new financial reporting standards will come into effect when the Society reregisters under the 2022 Act.
